#### **ABSTRACT**

Lockdowns and restrictions that were imposed on movements of people at the time of Pandemic, provided opportunity to organisation to test and experiment with work from home culture. Once the pandemic situation is over, organisations will evaluate whether work from home in general would be a better option for them or not. Many factors need to be considered by each organisation and it may result into multiple models of operations from complete work from home to mix of work from home and from office to complete work from office. The present paper discusses the different factors which affects cost and performance associated with this transformation process in different organisations. In the absence of statistical data and study on effect on productivity of an organisation that allows work from remote, subjective factors needs to be evaluated by concerned organisation and result will be very specific to them. In all, it is observed that, there is a good possibility that combination of work from home and remote may lead to better productivity and employee motivation and most of the organisation are going to have a Hybrid Workplace i.e., some professionals working from home, others from office and many others partially at home / office in near future.



# EMPLOYMENT AFTER RETIREMENT IN INDIA – AN EMPIRICAL STUDY

#### ABSTRACT

The ageing population has a detrimental impact on the country's socioeconomic resources and increases financial strain on the working population. OADR's rapid and unabated growth is becoming a huge socioeconomic worry for India. Efforts should be taken to integrate this greying population into the workforce, not just to make them economically self-sufficient, but also to keep them physically and psychologically fit. The current poll looks into why people work or don't work after they retire from their employment, and it provides crucial new insights into the many characteristics and variables that inspire people to work past retirement age. The study's primary data is collected through a structured questionnaire from 176 participants using a Google form, then analysed and presented using statistical techniques. The study also advises policymakers on the many initiatives that need to be made to reintegrate retirees into the workforce.





Women's participation rates are two to three times greater in China, Brazil, Indonesia, and Bangladesh than in India. Global study clearly shows that women's contribution to the economy boosts Gross Domestic Product (GDP), which is the cornerstone for a higher level of life. Only by raising women's involvement in the labour market will we be able to fulfil our goal of being a \$5 trillion economy by 2024-25. Women's contribution to GDP at 18 percent, is one of the lowest in the world. By 2025, increasing women's labour force participation by 10% could add \$770 billion to India's GDP.

In India, it has traditionally been the job of women to raise children and administer the household. Because few firms offer work-from-home options, flexible working hours, or creche services, many working mothers leave their careers after having a child. Employers must pay not just for maternity leave without receiving any employment from these women, but also for a substitute to complete the task. As a result, to avoid the double cost of maternity leave and benefits for the same job, businesses, particularly small businesses, do not hire many young female employees.

Another major issue concerning pregnant women is pregnancy discrimination. This involves discriminating attitude against women employees during pregnancy, childbirth or medical condition associated therewith. Pregnancy discrimination may include denial of time off or reasonable









#### ABSTRACT

E-governance is a powerful tool for management of operations due to rise in technology and education. E-filing of income tax returns is one of the vital tools of e-governance that helps the government to collect taxes effectively and efficiently. The government continues to improve the e-filing website and ITR forms, to reduce the complexity and present e-filing in a simple manner. Many sections of the society still face difficulty in e-filing of income tax returns by themselves. This paper has attempted to study the impact of income and occupation on the level of awareness and satisfaction of 250 respondents in Delhi-NCR towards e-filing with the objective to know their knowledge of tax structure and the tax portal. The primary survey data is collected through snowball sampling technique, based on a structured questionnaire. One-way ANOVA test is used to result in findings indicating that income and occupation impact the level of awareness and satisfaction towards e-filing of income tax returns. The contribution of direct taxes rose from Rs. 68,305 crores (36.31% to total taxes) in 2000-01 to Rs. 11,37,685 in 2018-19 (54.78% to total taxes).

E-filing of Income Tax Return became mandatory; vide CBDT notification No. 34/2013 dated 01.05.2013 for all assessees other than an individual who:

Is a super senior citizen and does not have income from regular business or profession.

In these two situations, he can file paper return but may still file electronic return if he wants. To facilitate electronic filing, a website was introduced, http://incometaxindiaefiling.gov.in/where tax payers could file their returns anytime during the day, with the provision of immediate confirmation from tax administration regarding receipt of returns, privacy and security, saving the draft, fast handling and storing of data.



#### ABSTRACT

The tax structure of India has undergone various reforms over the years, contributing towards The tax structure of India has undergone various reforms over the years, contributing towards increasedtax collection. The present paper discusses history of reforms and trend in revenue from personal taxes. It investigates the relationship of Personal Income Taxes with GDP, income wise trend of returns under different heads, trend in number of total tax payers (Personal Income Tax), the range of recome under which they file tax returns (Salary and Business heads), and the heads under which they pay tax. The result shows a strong degree of positive correlation between Personal Income Taxes and GDP (significant at 0.01 level). The authors conclude there is still need for tax reforms like expansion of the tax base, inclusion of agriculture and informal sector under tax ambit, providing more concessions to lower and middle-income class assesses and having a tighter tax administrative machinery. The tax structure of the country has undergone various changes over the years and various committees have given suggestions for improving tax rates and tax base to the benefit of the taxpayers and the Government. The tax system should be justified to ensure fair imposition of tax on all kinds of taxpayers. It should be common man friendly and impose higher liability on the richer section of people while the fact of the matter is that this section manipulates the tax concepts to their benefit. The poor section, not being fully aware of these manipulations usually is the worst sufferer and pays for his honesty. In 2017, the Government raised Rs. 26,500 crore from those who didn't file tax returns (1.7 crore), through a non-filer monitoring system, by tracking in-house information and tallying it with data on high-value transactions received from external agencies along with TDS and tax collected at source (TCS). The broad mechanism for collection and verification of financial information included data in respect of various types of high-value transactions from banks and FIs and high-value expenditure from commercial establishments in the form of Statement of Financial Transaction (SFT). This substantiates the fact that those who indulge in high value transactions do not pay taxes honestly and the honest low-income earning taxpayer suffers.

#### FINANCIAL LITERACY AND ITS DETERMINANTS: EVIDENCE FROM DELHI-NCR

#### ABSTRACT

Purpose: The purpose of this article is to determine the level of financial literacy along with its components amongst respondents of Delhi-NCR

Design/Methodology/Approach: Data is collected through random sampling and first-hand information is received through a structured questionnaire. Multivariate regression analysis is used for finding results.

Findings: As a percentage to the maximum, the mean financial literacy, financial attitude, financial knowledge and financial behaviour scores are found to be 72, 69, 77 and 69 per cent respectively. Gender, education, age and income are found to be significant determinants of financial literacy scores.

Practical Implications: To substantiate the efforts initiated by the Government, literacy programmes at the level of educational institutions can improve financial literacy and behavioural change. Basic financial concepts can augment one's understanding of money multiplying and its long-term implications. An early start for each individual leads to wealth creation at personal level and contributes to the country's economic growth.

Originality/Value: A comprehensive study has helped to identify areas that require attention, such as compound interest and risk diversification. Since mean financial literacy scores are higher among men, higher income groups and higher levels of education, the policy must focus on females, lower income and age groups.



#### ABSTRACT

The growth of the banking sector acts as an impetus for the economic progress of any country as they are interrelated. Although in India, regulators try to monitor the banking sector in a conservative fashion, not allowing too many risks to seep in but still the sector is exposed to its own set of challenges. The concurrent need is to find solutions to such problems. Non-Performing Assets (NPAs) remain one such burning issue. The objective of this study is to understand the underlying mechanism that paves way for high-profile NPAs. Ultimately, the result represented the decline in NPAs levels from 2018 to 2019. But the percentage of wilful defaults in gross NPAs is increasing and fraud cases are furthermore, on the rise. Hence grasping the gravity of the issue, this paper examines the trends of gross NPA, wilful defaults and frauds. To unravel the fundamental problem, we have analyzed the two massive cases of Kingfisher Airlines Ltd. and Firestar International Pvt Ltd. We have discussed how these scams took place with the core focus of lapses from the bank's side. We have analyzed those key failures to recognize the bank's point of view thereon. Besides this, we tried to find out the mistakes that can again cause banks to be hit by such massive scams. Some valuable recommendations are equally drawn in the preceding section of the paper.

When we talk about the problems of the Indian banking sector, the existence of Non-performing Assets (NPAs) acts like the elephant in the room. It is a problem that has been haunting the economy for more than two decades. In terms of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI)'s, an asset becomes non-performing when it ceases to generate income for the bank. The increasing non-performing assets (NPAs) of banks affect the financial stability of a country, profitability of banks, quality of bank assets and pose a severe level of stress on banks' balance sheets. There are several factors like industrial recession, sluggish economic growth, ineffective recovery system of banks, complex judicial procedures, wilful defaults, frauds, etc. contributing to the increase in NPAs.

But in this paper, we are only focusing on wilful defaults and frauds. Though the gross NPA as a percentage of gross advances observed a decline from 2018 to 2019 as a result of the Government's 4Rs strategy stated by Finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman. But the contribution of wilful defaults has increased up to 60% in the last five years (2014-2019). A borrower (individual or company) is considered a wilful defaulter when it does not repay the loan or debt taken even when the borrower is perfectly able to pay off the obligations or it diverts borrowed funds for other purposes or disposes off the asset provided by him to secure the loan without the knowledge of the bank.



#### **COVID-19- IMPACT ON LEARNING PROCESS**

#### ABSTRACT

Remote and online learning went mainstream during Covid-19 as most of the universities and schools were closed. Most teachers and students were not prepared for this abrupt change and were not familiar with the use of ICT tools for remote teaching learning. The non-availability of suitable power and telecom infrastructure, availability of universal tools for teaching and evaluation were great challenges for both teachers and students alike. The present study explores the perceptions of, and challenges faced by, the students of classes XI and XII in school and those in the University, residing in Delhi NCR.A total of 274respondents participated in the study by answering a structured questionnaire. Percentage method, chi-square test, bar graphs and pie charts have been used to analyse and present the data. The study concludes that students' preference for online learning is independent of income level, gender, level of numerical/lab work in subject studied and their educational level. The remote teaching learning is expected to stay in the future, the government as well as the educational institutions should focus on improving infrastructure and training of the teachers and the students alike.



The sudden shift to online teaching as a result of the covid-19 pandemic has placed an enormous burden on teachers to quickly adapt to new pedagogical methods. They have been forced to learn and master various tools in order to deliver online classes, evaluate assignments, and track students' progress. The current study investigates the perceptions and challenges of teachers of classes XI and XII in school and those in university, who are expected to be familiar with ICT tools and platforms. The study employs both primary and secondary sources of information, and a total of 276 respondents took part in the survey by filling the questionnaire and providing us with the data needed. Lack of training, limitations of available technology at home, technical challenges and lack of proper equipment and tools make instructors feel uncomfortable to teach remotely. Many teachers consider teaching as their main role and view the ICT tools used for remote teaching as an addition to their daily tasks. Internal barriers that include fear of technology, computer anxiety, and badly defined roles are also faced by the Teachers.



#### ABSTRACT

Work-life balance, defined as "a state of equilibrium in which the demands of both a person's job and personal life are equal" (Lockwood, 2003) has been a global challenge for decades.

While economic empowerment of women has resulted in greater numbers joining the workforce, they are still disproportionately responsible for the unpaid household responsibilities and caregivers for the family all across the globe. This imbalance has been accentuated by the work from home scenario thrust upon humanity by the ongoing Covid 2019 pandemic. 



#### TIME-USE AND STRESS IN MARRIED WORKING WOMEN

#### ABSTRACT

As more and more women join the work force, they continue to be responsible for care giving work at home leading to a work-family conflict. Married working women have the additional responsibilities of homecare, childcare and elderly care, in addition to their work. Consequently, their time use depicts a greater number of unpaid hours in these roles, limiting their time for relaxation, social interaction and leisure. This directly leads to higher stress levels. Primary data is collected using a structured questionnaire and the responses collected online. Additional information is collected through various secondary sources. The study analyses the stress levels at home of 134 married working women residing in Delhi NCR. The data thus collected is presented though tables and graphs and is analyzed using regression analysis. The stress levels are analyzed taking into consideration, various factors like family structure, job level, time use per day and support system at work and home. The study concludes that availability of support systems at home and availability of time for self-relaxation and leisure are significant factors in reducing stress at home. These factors overcome the additional responsibilities of care giving in a multi-generational family home.

Consequently, women are less likely to be employed in the labour force. The need to manage home and care giving roles also leads to pay inequality.

At work, women face lack of leaves for childcare and elderly care. Most of the workplaces are not conducive to childcare and lack support mechanisms like creches and day care. Long working and irregular hours and non-flexible schedules take a toll on the health and general well-being of the working woman and work-family conflict. The responsibility for childcare and elderly care in many cases places a large economic burden on the family with the working women taking the option of leaving the job.


A 2015 survey of more than 9,500 women by Thompson Reuters and Rockefeller foundation in G20 countries' found out the work-life balance has the highest priority for women. # INVESTMENT STRATEGY BASED ON CORRELATION IN GLOBAL STOCK EXCHANGES

#### ABSTRACT

Predicting performance of stock markets has been a quest for all investors. An investor relies on his understanding of Global cues and expert advice and would plan the investment strategy. This requires an intense effort to watch the market trends and factors influencing the markets carefully and be proactive in trading as per the cues. Many predictive models have been used to assess the market using mathematical tools like Machine Learning and other techniques which are complex for a normal person to grasp. With the globalisation of the economy, the stock markets have become closely correlated. This paper examines if the correlation of the stock markets can be used to predict the stock prices and a noeffort trading policy that performs auto-trades, without any intervention by the trader, can be derived. The study uses stock indices data for 2020 to predict behaviour of BSE SENSEX and selected stocks in 2021. Using the correlation, it derives a trading strategy to beat the market in 2021 to generate value that is higher than the rise in stock prices over 2021. Lagged indices are used to take advantage of different operating hours of the stock markets. Correlation models, polynomial relationships and mathematical models are used to carry out the analysis.

The stock markets are dependent on many factors for their performance. Political and Global events, financial policies, growth of economy, performance of leading companies or sectors of economy, flow of funds from large investors, exchange rate fluctuations, natural calamities, are some of the factors that would determine how the stock market would preform on a particular day. A retail investor has very low visibility into the events and is generally at a loss to predict the movement of the stock market. Hence the trading strategy most investors employ is to listen to expert advice and monitor the movement of stocks continuously. Nowadays, many software tools and apps make this job simpler by sending alerts triggered by user set thresholds.

However, the investors are always looking for a no-effort investment tool that can predict the movement of the stocks and give them returns that are better than the market. In this paper we attempt to use correlation between leading Global stock exchanges to develop a mathematical model that could be used for investing in Bombay stock exchange.

#### Literature Review

(Junior et al., 2015) examine 83 stock market indices using correlation. The lagged values of stock market indices has been also considered for the analysis. They report that information flow between stock exchanges lagged by day is similar to same day correlation with them

(Nobi et al., 2014) examine relationships between Korean indices and Global indices over 2000-2012 time period and conclude that the relationships have become more correlated over time.

(Kumar Tiwari et al., 2013) explore the correlation between nine major Asian stock markets between 2005 and 2012 and conclude that the stock markets are highly integrated.


(Ni & Xu, 2021) attempt to predict the correlation between the global stock markets using Deppe Learning method and show that their model provides better results than existing methodologies.

#### Interdependence Between Indian and Global Stock Exchanges- A Measure of Liberalisation of Economy

#### ABSTRACT

The Indian economy has seen swung from the balance of payment crises in 1991 to being the fastest growing economy in world, mainly due to the measures taken to open up and liberalise the economy. The liberalisation of economy has resulted in greater flow of capital to Indian stock markets and hence the impact of global events on Indian markets has become more pronounced. The foreign trade has also increased with the liberalisation of the economy.

This study analyses the correlation between Indian and some selected Global stock indices from 1987 and 2021 and concludes that the stock index correlation has markedly improved after liberalisation. Further it also analyses the flow of foreign capital into Indian stock markets and the changes in foreign trade. The study concludes that while the flow of foreign capital is aligned with the co-dependence of Indian and foreign markets, the changes in foreign trade do not exhibit this correlation. Hence the stock market correlation and flow of foreign capital could be considered as one of the indicators of the liberalisation of the conomy.

#### Introduction

India had a balance of payment crises in 1991 when the foreign exchange reserves could meet only three weeks of the imports. Low ratings from Moody's did not allow the government to seek short term loans which ultimately resulted in the country using its gold reserves to tide over the crises. The balance of payment crises led to reforms resulting in liberalisation of the Indian economy.

Before liberalisation the Indian Rupee was non-convertible, and the key element of the national economic policy was import substitution. This made foreign trade extremely difficult. Foreign investment in Indian stock markets was negligible and thus the stock markets were largely insulated from the global trends.

The reforms undertaken in 1991 included abolishing the industrial licenses required in all except 18 industries, reducing licenses requirement for imports, removing limits on accumulation of capital and abolishing restrictions on foreign investments. This led to opening up of the Indian economy to the world. The foreign direct investment in India which was USD 97 million in 1991 rose to a staggering \$82 billion in 2021, making India the fifth largest recipient of FDI in the world.



# Impact of Corporate Attributes on Sustainability (ESG) Reporting: Evidence from Listed Banks in India

#### Abstract

The present study aims to examine the Sustainability (ESG) reporting practices and the impact of some corporate characteristics (age, size, profitability, leverage, and international presence) on the extent of sustainability disclosure of listed banks in India. The sample consisted of all ten banks listed on S&P BSE Bankex representing a large market share of the Indian banking sector. The Sustainability/CSR/Business responsibility reports of the sample companies for the FY 2019-20 were examined through the content analysis method using a self-developed Sustainability Reporting Disclosure Index (SRDI) based on the review of literature and standards on sustainability disclosure. The multiple regression technique is used to identify significant corporate attributes affecting Sustainability Reporting (SR). The findings indicate that dimensions like environment, human rights and labour practices are the least reported by selected banks. The regression results show that there is a positive and significant impact of size and leverage on the level of sustainability disclosure whereas age, profitability, and international presence are found to be insignificant. Corporate attributes like size, leverage and international presence are found to be positively and significantly associated with sustainability reporting among the selected banks. However, age and profitability are found to have a negative relationship. The empirical studies on the extent of ESG disclosure and its relationship with firm characteristics especially in the banking sector of developing countries like India are scarce, so this study is an attempt to fill this gap.

Due to increasing industrialisation as a result of economic development, several risks in the form of climate change, environmental degradation and depletion of natural resources have been posed and made sustainable development a global concern. Companies can contribute to sustainable development by embracing the triple bottom line approach to CSR which includes environmental, social and economic performance and

catering to all stakeholders which are important in the firm's achievement of sustainable development. It has become imperative for business organisations to embed sustainability into their core business strategy by considering social and environmental issues apart from economic performance<sup>2</sup>.

In a global survey by KPMG (2020)<sup>1</sup> in 52 countries, it has been found that sustainability or ESG reporting is increasingly recognized as a critical component of corporate reporting by financial stakeholders worldwide. So there has been an increasing demand by various

In the state of Punjab, the heart of the green revolution in India, a large fraction of agricultural labour is expended by migrant workers. The unplanned lockdown imposed by the Indian government affected paddy transplantation, a labour-intensive activity in Punjab primarily due to interstate restrictions on movement. Drawing on a primary survey in a village from the Malwa region of Punjab, the paper examines the changes in agrarian relations in rural Punjab due to the Covid-19 pandemic by critically analysing the dynamics of capital labour relations. The restriction on labour movement and unilateral imposition of transplantation wage rates by a few Panchayats in Puniab (dominated by capitalist landlords and rich peasants) has intensified class conflict in the state. The Punjab government's policies, which are driven by the capitalist landlords and rich peasants, have played a significant role in the increased exploitation of workers. The paper concludes with a brief evaluation of the changes induced by Covid-19 in the agrarian political economy of Puniab.

In recent years, food has been the subject of active discussion and research across many disciplines in the humanities and social sciences. Food 'influences virtually every aspect of human life' (Pilcher 2012: xix), and topics concerning it can and should be studied from multiple perspectives. 

### Abstract

# **Buddhism in India and Society**

Buddhism a religion and a belief which had its origin in India but influenced the minds of whole world were founded by Gautama Buddha as he is popularly known. "Gautama Buddha lived and taught mostly in the north eastern part of ancient India sometime between the 6th and 4th centuries BCE". There are different view regarding the birth and death of Buddhism. Some Scholar believes that "Buddha was born around 563 BCE and died around 483 BCE". Acc to P.V. Bapat, "In the year 623 B.C. queen Mahamaya while travelling from kapilvastu to Devadaha to her parent's home gave birth to Siddhartha in the Lumbini grow." 3

Although Buddhism was a religions movement but Buddhism had a very close connection with the society. The society during this time was clearly stratified due to the expanding economy the tribal groups were getting assimilated in the society. The growing phase of urbanization and economy created a lack of space for the tribal communities who ultimately got assimilated into the social order. They undertook professions like basket weaving and hunting. They specialized in their economic occupation and got merged in the social order.

"The process of absorbing tribals at the lower level the hierarchy was made possible because Hindu society gave them a minimum economic security which could not be attained under the tribal system particularly after the tribes had been affected by encroachment on the fertile portions of their land."4

# THE HIGH & LOW ORDERS OF THE SOCIETY:

Due to the increasing large holdings of land and their ownership by private individuals, a conduction of hired labour was created to make them work on these large holdings. The best example to know about the size of the holdings is "Brathmana Kasibharadvaja of the village of Ekanata is described a using 500 ploughs." 5

The term dasa — kammakara and porisas are mentioned in the suitta nipata referring to those who worked in as laboures within and outside the households. We also get reference to the word 'dalidda' referring to a very poor person. Those who did not have even sufficient to eat and drink were the very poor sections of the society.

On the other hand there were very rich people in the society who lived a luxurious life with surplus for their recreation and enjoyment. "In contast, there were people who lived comfortably or even luxuriously, possessing gold, silver grain, a carriage, and a beautiful house, with servants to work for them" 6

The differentiation in distribution of health created conditions of tension in the society. We get reference to an incident in the Majjahima Nikaya' in which the dasi's face was physically assaulted by her mistress for dasi kali's disobedient behaviour.



ABSTRACT: The present paper brings out the status of women as reflected in the commentary on Vinaypitak known as Samantapasadika. The commentary refers to the various roles played by the women in the society,. The text also refers to the various kinds of dresses and ornamentation of women. Women education has also been discussed in the paper.

'Samantapasadika' is a commentary on the 'Vinayapitak' It was written by Buddhaghosa at the request of Buddhsri. It was written in Pali language. Pali was also the language of the Buddhist canonical literature. In 'Samantapasadika' 'samanta' means four directions and pasadika' means to cool down. It was compiled in Sri Lanka by Buddhaghosa in the 5th Century C.E. In writing this commentary Buddhaghosa consulted the ancient commentaries Mahaparchariya and Kurndi. For a better understanding of the Tripitaka, 'Atthakatha's were written. In 'Samantapasadika' the author provides a sufficient insight into socio-economic political, philosophical and religious history of India. The Sinhalese commentaries were translated into Pali by Buddhaghosa. It was after the introduction of the commentarial literature that the monks and the laities could understand the words of the Buddha. The interpretation of difficult words in the 'Vinayapitak' and its basic understanding could be made possible due to this commentary. Besides the basic understanding of the text the commentary also deals with instances and stories from the life of Buddha .'. Before the introduction of the commentarial literature, Buddhism had lost its basic language i.e. Pali.The Buddhist texts began to be written by some of the Buddhist sects in Sanskrit. Buddha emphasized more on making the use of Pali as a method of instruction because Pali was the language of the common people, however due to the use of Sanskrit in the later periods by various Buddhist sects the people found it difficult to understand them. From the Samantapasadikawe can get a glimpse of the society, The condition of women and her status in the society has also been described in parts in the text.

#### STATUS OF WOMEN:

From the text we come to know that sons were preferred over daughters in the society. The birth of a son was rejoiced. The birth of a female was not looked down upon however the birth of sons was preferred. Women were mostly engaged in the society household works. In the society they were considered to be subordinate to men. They had to obey the order of their husband and did not have any right to take decisions. From the parajik we get reference to nine types of women.

### स्वाधीनता संग्राम और हिंदी फ़िल्मी गीत

पराधीनता की बेडियों में जकड़ा हुआ हमारा देश 1930 के आस-पास स्वतंत्रता के लिए पुरजोर कोशिश कर रहा था। 1931 की 14 मार्च को हिंदी की पहली बोलती फिल्म 'आलम-आरा' प्रदर्शित हुई थी इसके लगमग 9 दिन बाद प्रसिद्ध यानी कि 23 मार्च को देश के लिए अनमोल भगत सिंह को फांसी दी गई। पूरे देश में गुस्सा था। फिल्मी गीत और संगीत, फिल्में किसी भी देश में राष्ट्रीयता के भाव को जगाने और देश में देश-प्रेम की अलख जगाने बढ़ाने में महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका निभा सकते हैं। ब्रिटिश शासन अपने बल को किसी भी कीमत पर कम होता बर्दाश्त नहीं कर पा रहे थे इसलिए फिल्मों पर और फिल्मी गीत संगीत पर भी अपना शिकंजा कस रहे थे और समय–समय पर फिल्मों पर फिल्मीं गीतों पर पाबंदियां लगा रहे थे। पाबंदियां जितनी अधिक लगती गयी देश में आजादी पाने की चाह उतनी ही तीव्र होती गई। फिल्में और फिल्म संगीत लोगों को साहस दे रहे थे. जोश भर रहे थे। पराधीनता की बेडियों को तोड डालने के लिए प्रोत्साहित कर रहे थे। कविताओं और गैर फिल्मी गीतों को प्रतिबंधित करना थोड़ा मुश्किल होता था, पर फिल्मों पर और फिल्मी गीतों पर सेंसर बोर्ड के माध्यम से शिकंजा कसना यानी की प्रतिबंध लगाना ज्यादा कठिन नहीं था। यही मुख्य कारण है कि आजादी प्राप्त कर करने से पहले कोई भी फिल्म प्रोड्यूसर महान शहीद भगत सिंह के जीवन पर आधारित फिल्म का निर्माण करने में असमर्थ ही रहे। हालांकि देश के स्वाधीन होने पर उन पर आधारित फिल्मों का निर्माण जरूर हुआ।

ब्रिटिश हकुमत द्वारा लगाई गई अनिगनत पाबंदियों के बाद भी फिल्म निर्माताओं ने अपनी फिल्मों से, फिल्मी गीतों के जरिये देश के लोगों में देश-प्रेम को जगाया। राष्ट्रीयता को प्रोत्साहित किया। स्वाधीनता सेनानियों की ही तरह हमारे फिल्म निर्माताओं ने भी अपनी फिल्मों के जरिए देश की आजादी के लिए जाने वाले संघर्ष में अपना अमुल्य योगदान दिया। जब से हम बोलती फिल्मों का अस्तित्व पाते हैं उसके लगभग दो-तीन वर्ष के भीतर भले ही हमें सीधे तौर पर देश प्रेम पर आधारित रचनाएं, फिल्मों के माध्यम से सुनने को, देखने को नहीं मिली हो, पर लगभग 1935 में नगरदास नामक जैसे बेहतरीन संगीतकार ने प्रफुल्ल राय द्वारा निर्देशित 'भारत लक्ष्मी पिक्चर्स' के अंतर्गत आने वाली फिल्म 'बलिदान' के गीत (एक दिन तुम थे जगदगुरु, जग था उन्नत अभिलाषी, जागो-जागो भारत वासी) रच कर देश की जनता को स्वाधीनता के लिए प्रेरित किया। इसके बाद इसी वर्ष संगीतकार नागरदास नायक जी की ही धुन पर देश भक्ति भाव से भरा पंडित सुदर्शन द्वारा रिवत गीत भी आया गीत के बोल थे 'भारत की दीन दशा का तुम्हें भारतवालों, कुछ ध्यान नहीं। फिल्म का नाम था कुंवारी या विधवा' ठीक-ठाक इन दिनों ही गीतों के गायककार के बारे में तो जानकारी नहीं मिल पाई पर

In this paper, we investigate the chaotic behaviour of maps having the almost average shadowing property by obtaining the relationship of the almost average shadowing property with different kinds of chaos. Moreover, we relate the notion of almost average shadowing property with some other types of shadowing properties, for instance, ergodic shadowing,  $\mathcal{F}_{d}$ -shadowing and d-shadowing. We also study the notion of almost average shadowing property for maps induced on hyperspaces. Our study is supported by providing counterexamples wherever necessary.

Computer simulation of the trajectory of a point in discrete dynamical systems often produces pseudo-orbits. So to study the dynamical properties of the underlying dynamical system, it is important to determine the condition under which these numerically obtained pseudo-orbits can be traced by real trajectories of the system. Shadowing property makes it possible to approximate pseudo-orbits by real orbits of the system and this feature of shadowing property has made it an extremely significant and useful dynamical property in dynamical systems. There are several types of shadowing property, the notion of average shadowing property [5] and the notion of almost average shadowing property [6] deal with pseudo-orbits with average errors being very small whereas the notion of asymptotic average shadowing property [11] deals with pseudo-orbits with average errors tending to zero. These shadowing properties are also related to some useful dynamical properties [6, 17, 20, 22, 23, 29].



### THE INSCRIPTION OF LAW IN LIFE: INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY AND COMMODIFICATION OF LIFE (PART 2)

#### I. Introduction

What demarcates intellectual property from ordinary forms of property is its ability to demonstrate an inventive step. In fact, the grant of intellectual property is contingent on the demonstration of novelty and non-obviousness. A foundational demand therefore for patents is that invention is at an "adequate distance beyond or above the state of the art", and distinguishable from artefacts of nature. It premises itself on clear distinctions between the "grown" and the "made", between acts of invention and discovery, between products of nature and human manufactures, between public domain and non-obvious knowledge. "Obvious" ideas/knowledge are often in the public domain and are typically designated as prior art, oral tradition, common practice, commonly shared knowledge that cannot be claimed as original acts of individual creation. IP claims are inextricably tied to the idea of authorship and invention. Traditional, indigenous knowledge falls short of this criterion as it often is orally transmitted, inter-generational, often admitting natural or supernatural agency and therefore making the distinction between man-made and natural and godly indistinct for assignment of authorship.<sup>3</sup> authorship.3

It was in this context that the enclosure of biogenetic commons seemed to pose a set of problems not commonly encountered by IP in other realms. It was one thing to demonstrate items of "manufacture" as products of human innovation; it was quite another to demonstrate "nature", or its parts thereof, as products and projects of human invention. How could living organisms be shown to be products of human invention when patent law remains tied to its own version of a proprietary distinction between nature and manufactures? Indeed, the distinction itself should have been sufficient to disqualify any normative or ecological claims

# THE MAGHA TRADERS AND KINGS AND THEIR COINAGE IN HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

#### MANISHA S. AGNIHOTRI

Introduction: Nomenclature of the Maghas

Generally most of the names of the Magha Kings ends with the word 'Magha' as surname. The word 'Magha' has been variously interpreted. One may equate the Maghas and seek their derivation from the word 'Maghavan', which means Indra, connecting, them with an ancient powerful deity. Others relate them to the name of an island by this name and to the country of the others (the Mlecchas). The names of the Maghas has phonetic resemblance with 'Maga' or 'Moga'. Some take them to be indigenous people whereas others consider the word Maga to be foreign. In view of the multiple opinions on the etymology and derivation of the word, nothing can be said with certitude. There are some scholars who suggest that this dynasty was founded by a Lieutenant of the Kuṣāṇa named Magha.1


#### Maghas in Literary Sources

There are three literary sources which furnish some details about the Magha merchants and the rulers by this name. These literary sources may be enumerated as (i)The Purāṇas (ii) The Mahābhārata and (iii) The Divyāvadāna. The Maghas are properly described as the most powerful people (mahābalāḥ)2 in the Purānas. The Purānas also mention nine prudent kings of Kośala3 but they do not give details regarding their rule. More prolific details about the Magha merchants and rulers comes from the Supriyāvadānam in the Divyāvadāna.4 An analysis of the internal details of the Avadana brings out the prosperity of trade and commerce as enterprising activities of the leader of a mercantile caravan (sārthavāha), the Magha Chief Supriya and his five hundred fellow traders, who embarked on a very perilous journey along with him for getting precious jewels of various descriptions from the region of the Badaradvīpa, situated in the lap of the Himalayan range. The fascinating and awe-inspiring accounts of the mercantile mission starting from Varanasi and passing through the city of Rauhitaka ( Modern Rohataka, near Delhi) and at last terminating with the arrival and fulfilment of the mission at Badara


Since 2010, Indians have spent nearly 3 million hours in prison on charges of sedition. An accused is most likely to spend up to 50 days in prison until a trial court grants bail and up to 200 days until a high court does so. The exhaustive database of Article 14 (corroborated by the NCRB data) reveals that more than 13,000 Indians are trapped in a black hole since 2010.

It is time, therefore, that the sedition law (IPC, Section 124 A) is consigned to the bin. However, as we wait with bated expectation after the Supreme Court order (to keep the 152-year old sedition law in abeyance), and after Prime Minister Narendra Modi's willingness to reconsider the colonial law in the spirit of Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav, a cautionary check is in order.




